to develop the skills to carry out experiments themselves. To help teachers teach science through Investigations, Seven Sides Publishing has provided a series of lab manuals for Physics, Chemistry, and Biology. These manuals are a rich resource of simple hands-on labs. These three lab manuals (Biology, Chemistry, and Physics) cover 100% of the TEKS for five classes (Biology, Chemistry, Physics, IPC, and Environmental Systems). Together Physics and Chemistry cover 100% of the TEKS for IPC, and Biology also covers 100% of the TEKS for Environmental Systems). There is a shortage of user-friendly labs for science concepts. Too many labs have too much busy information in them; this is not the case here. We have taken a lot of the traditional labs that have been around for decades and simplified them, so they are easy for students and teachers to read and perform. Each section starts with a concept map that organizes vocabulary to speak to your students to give visual clues to

allow understanding and relationships of the vocabulary. Each section ends with a list of virtual investigations that will complement those found in this book. Having students learn through investigations allows students to efficiently learn content and skills in the context of other content and skills; this allows students to chunk this information and skills into their long-term memory easily. The authors of RealTime Physics Active Learning Laboratories, Module 1: Mechanics, 3rd Edition - David Sokoloff, Priscilla Laws, and Ron Thornton - have been pioneers in the revolution of the physics industry. In this edition, they provide a set of labs that utilize modern lab technology to provide hands-on information, as well as an empirical look at several new key concepts. They focus on the teaching/learning issues in the lecture portion of the course, as well as logistical lab issues such as space, class size, staffing, and equipment maintenance. Issues similar to those in the lecture have to

with preparation and willingness to study. As technology advances, education has expanded from the classroom into other formats including online delivery, flipped classrooms and hybrid delivery. Congruent with these is the need for alternative formats for laboratory experiences. This explosion in technology has also placed in the hands of a majority of students a sensor suite tucked neatly into their smartphones or smart tablets. The popularity of these devices provides a new avenue for the non-traditional kinematic lab experience. This book addresses this issue by providing 13 labs spanning the common topics in the first semester of university-level physics. Each lab is designed to use only the student's smartphone, laptop and items easily found in big-box stores or a hobby shop. Each lab contains theory, set-up instructions and basic analysis techniques. All of these labs can be performed outside of the traditional university lab

setting and initial costs averaging less than \$8 per student, per lab, excluding the smartphone and laptop.

Over 50 extended projects are described in detail. I evaluated the teaching effectiveness of the lab manual using a survey at the end of the Fall 2017 semester, revised the lab manual, and evaluated it again at the end of the Fall 2018 semester. The 2018 lab manual improved upon the 2017 lab manual overall but did not effectively implement an inquiry-based lab. Further work can be done to study how the skills gained in this laboratory section help student success in future lab experiences at EMU.
