Are older drivers posing increasing risk to the public? If so, what public policies might mitigate that risk? Older drivers (those 65 and older) are slightly likelier than drivers aged 25 to 64 to cause an accident, but drivers aged 18 to 24 are nearly three times likelier than older drivers to do so. The

authors of this paper conclude that stricter licensing policies targeting older drivers would likely not improve traffic safety substantially. In 2012, the Chilean government enacted a zero tolerance law that lowered the permissible blood alcohol content (BAC) threshold from 0.5 to 0.3, which also instituted severe financial and license revocation penalties for drivers of all ages. Using a rich panel municipality-level administrative record data set, this paper employs a difference-in-differences strategy to estimate the causal impact of the law on car accidents and fatality rates. Results indicate that the law reduced the number of alcohol-

related car accidents by 18% to a quarter of all accidents, which is entirely driven by non-fatal incidents. Evidence also indicates that the law works by increasing sober driving, not by reducing drunk drivers' alcohol consumption. Supporting current findings, this paper also shows evidence that the law has no effects on fatality rates. Lastly, it shows a three-month-long anticipation effects that coincide with the bill's announcement, which I attribute to a public confusion of the difference between the announcement and the enactment of the law. As the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) reports, drunk driving claims nearly 30 lives daily through road carnage and related incidents. The states of Massachusetts and Texas have various rules that regulate the sale and consumption of alcohol to avert its adverse impacts. The laws in both states set out the minimum blood alcohol content (BAC) for drivers, penalties imposed on drunk drivers as well as jail terms. While the US grapples

with a high number of drunk driving-related deaths, the trend in China is strikingly different. With stricter laws, the number of annual deaths caused by drunk driving deaths is around 1,500 (Xiao, Ning, Schwebel, & Hu, 2017). The papers report that amphetamines can induce risky

driving behavior, tranquilizers can increase traffic accident risks, barbiturates can degrade driving skills especially when the drug is combined with alcohol, while marijuana use can impair important driving skills. Another paper evaluates drug use and driving risk among high school students in Toronto: results show that the total effect of infrequent use of drugs on accidents is small compared to alcohol use. A study of out-patients in Finland notes that the combined use of alcohol and drugs tend to increase accident frequency. One paper refutes that Alcohol Safety Action Programs in the United States are ineffective. This collection can be helpful

for sociologist, psychologists, psychiatrists, traffic safety officers, and heads of urban safety and traffic divisions. Multiple alcohol control policies have been enacted since the early 1980s to keep drunk drivers off the roads and to prevent more alcohol-related traffic fatalities. In this paper, we analyze nine traffic policies to determine the extent to which each policy contributes to effective alcohol-related fatality prevention. Compared with the existing literature, this paper addresses a more comprehensive set of traffic policies. In addition, we used a panel GLS model that holds regional effects and state-specific time effects constant to

analyze their impact on alcohol-related fatalities with two distinct rates: alcohol-related traffic deaths per capita and alcohol-related traffic deaths per total traffic deaths. While per capita alcohol-related traffic deaths is used more often in other studies, alcohol-related traffic deaths per total traffic deaths better reflects the impact of policies on deterring drunk driving. In addition, regional analyses were conducted to determine the policies that are more effective in certain regions. The findings of this study suggest that zero tolerance laws and increased beer taxes are the most effective policies in reducing alcohol-related

A preliminary breath test law reduces the procedural problems associated with

obtaining evidence of drunk driving and thus increases the probability that a drunk driver will be arrested. In 1985, only 23 states had a preliminary breath test law. According to the theory of deterrence, increasing the probability of arrest for drunk driving will reduce the future occurrence of this behavior. The data set employed to test the theory is a time series from 1980 to 1985 of cross sections of the 48 contiguous states. Four highway mortality rates are used as measures of drunk driving. The effect of the breath test law was estimated using four independent variable models and 12 dummy variable models. The four

independent variable models were also estimated using Leamer's specification test. The purpose of using these alternative specifications and Leamer's specification test was to examine the breath test coefficients for specification bias. The econometric results show that the passage of a breath test law has a significant deterrent effect on drunk driving. Simulations with these results suggest that if all states had a preliminary breath test law, highway mortality could be reduced by about 2000 deaths per year

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
